3) Francis St update

On the 26/9/11 a meeting was held between community and Vic Roads representatives re Francis Street. The following notes were prepared by Jen Lilburn.

Present were: Nick Fisher – Manager Program Development (Vic Roads), Stan Januszkiewicz – A/Manager Road Operations (Vic Roads), Bruce Light – President Yarraville On The Nose Inc., Bert Boere – Secretary Brooklyn Residents Action Group Inc., Jen Lilburn – Convenor Brooklyn Community Representative Group

Items discussed and requiring further action:

- Wire ropes installed by Vic Roads to reduce trucks parking on the road verge as the safest
 option have not alleviated the dust issue, particularly given that parking has been re-instigated
 in some sections (HBCC signage), and that the area beyond the wire rope remains unsealed
 and very dusty.
- Vic Roads preferred option to eliminate parking along the verge (safety hazard) could be achieved by increasing the length of wire rope, and to sow grass/install footpaths between the rope barrier and the fence line. The work beyond the wire rope would be HBCC's responsibility.
- Importance of ongoing maintenance Vic Roads' responsibility is for arterial road maintenance/upgrade is curb-road-curb, or if there is no curb (as in this case): 3m from the white line at the edge of the road across the road 3m from the white line on the other side. Beyond this is local government's responsibility.
- Unsealed yards and driveways are contributing to the dust problem, as is the western side of Cemetery Road which carries significant truck traffic.
- The best option would be to seal the verge to the fence line but it is unlikely that funding will be available for a project of this scale. Priorities for government funding on roads are targeted at roads where there is a high proportion of vehicle accidents/casualties. Curbing is generally used to direct water flow not really a necessity for this (very flat) stretch of road.
- Bruce indicated that 'cleaning up' of this area is integral to lifting the image of the West and changing the way in which people living in the West feel about their neighbourhood/suburb. Along with the dust being a physical health issue, this is also a mental health issue.
